Theme : From the Field of Borders-Current Situation and Challenges faced by the Displaced Populations at Thai-Myanmar Borders

The current situation and challenges of displaced people in Myanmar was presented to understand such a global humanitarian crisis with the first-hand experience faced by the local humanitarian experts mainly in the northern region of Myanmar. After a presentation regarding the ongoing support for each sector such as humanitarian needs including food, shelter and education as well as support for civil society, participants discussed future support needs and the type of support required from the international community including Japan. (There are estimated to be 17.6 million people in Myanmar who require humanitarian assistance, and 19.6 million people displaced by conflict.)

Currently, the humanitarian corridor has been proposed at the Thailand-Myanmar border area and humanitarian assistance led by the Thai Red Cross and Myanmar Redcross began on March 25th for the first time. On the other hand, some displaced communities and the humanitarian supporters have shared some concerns about safety and security issues for the displaced populations especially from the ethnic groups relocated in conflict affected communities at the borders.

Regarding the above-mentioned assistance, there were some field reports that some authorities were also providing assistance together with Myanmar Redcross in some areas, and displaced populations had been questioning the effectiveness of such humanitarian assistance from the beginning of this planning of the humanitarian assistance. Regarding these concerns, even before the aid was actually deployed, local humanitarian experts were appealing to the international community for assistance that should directly reach to the displaced populations by ongoing conflict. United Nations has also its own limitation to reach out to the areas of displaced populations at the borders due to its lack of access. Therefore, these humanitarian experts believe that necessary assistance are not reaching enough to the people at the border areas where there are many ethnic groups in greater need of humanitarian assistance.

What can Japan and the international community do for such humanitarian crisis faced by the border in response to such a need? What is needed is to listen more carefully to the voices of the people on the ground, to help people become protected and empowered through self-reliance, and to cooperate with the international community to provide support in a variety of ways so that people can mutually help themselves in this crisis together with international community's continued support. Further continuation of this kind of dialogue between the people working in the field and the international community was requested among participants and the humanitarian experts also thanked for being able to share to the international community.
